police or popular vote anywhere can resist him when he determines to act. Though his influence remains invisible to me, nevertheless, he is at work:

The king's heart is a water channel in the hand of the Lord; he turns it wherever he will. (Proverbs 21:1)

And in this great, hidden work of shaping history—of toppling arrogant rulers, or bringing them to power; of establishing just law or allowing it to be trampled—in all this, the Jesus who loves me is acting as Lord, strangely working all things together for the good of his people, those who love him.

Soon, what is hidden will be revealed; the invisible Hand that governs nations and peoples will become visible and everyone will know for sure what Nebuchadnezzar, that ancient despot, learned most painfully: **Heaven rules.**

I mean a great deal then, when I say as a Christian: Jesus, the incarnate Son of God, is Lord of the nations.

A Meditation On Our Words

What do I mean when I say as a Christian: Jesus, the incarnate Son of God, is Lord of the nations?

I mean, first, that the nations are in great need of a man to lead them to live in peace with order and justice, and to atone for them; a man to give them what no nation or state can give its citizens: peace with God; a man to heal the ravages of war and ethnic cleansing and poverty, and the pretentiousness that haunts their prosperity; and I mean too, that they have that man in Jesus, because he really is the Son of God in human flesh.

But when I say that Jesus is Lord of the nations *I mean, secondly, that in his mercy he gives a grace common to all human beings* in the fantastic variety of created nature, and in every rich cultural blessing; in the restraint against chaos provided by government—even bad government; and that he calls on his people to live with courage and self-sacrifice, standing for what is just and good in the life of their nation.

But when I say I believe that Jesus is Lord of the nations, *I also mean that in every historical moment, he supervises and governs the nations*; he rules their rulers. Christ causes the rise of governments and civilizations and takes credit in his Word for their downfall. He holds sway over congresses and parliaments and dictatorships; over their lies and cover-ups, over their navies and armies, mysteriously influencing all things. Yet he regards human choices as fraught with significance and utterly accountable to him.

But let me not forget this, that when I say Jesus is Lord of the nations *I* mean too, that when he returns he will sift the nations, punishing their evil. And perhaps too, he will save from their historical life and purify, whatever has been good, true, and beautiful in the nations, bestowing it all on the City of God, according to that cryptic promise,

The glory and honor of the nations will be brought into the city. (Revelation 21:26)

And when I say Jesus is Lord of the nations *I freely confess that he uses secondary causes*, orchestrating them all as Supreme Governor of the world. He will use war; economic free falls; he will use the political laziness of electorates or he will use their passion; he will use the treaties of nations and prayers and the propaganda of ideologues. But make no mistake: when I call Jesus Lord of the nations I mean to say he brought down atheistic Soviet communism in eastern Europe; that he humbles American pride as he sees fit; I mean that in his mercy he restrains the dark powers of secularism in Europe so that people are not crushed by the destructiveness of writing God out of their own worldviews; I mean that it is he, the sovereign Lord, who has given rise to the Arab Spring.

I say, then, a great deal when I confess that Jesus, the Man-God, is Lord of the nations. I say what ought to make me more bold and more confident as a disciple of him who loved me and gave himself up for me: I say that no elected official, no tyrant-usurper of political power, no fighter plane, no secret
