Sons & Daughters

I was raised in a Christian home; I can't remember a time when the presence of God did not surround me. When I was 9 years old my Sunday School teacher shared the four spiritual laws booklet with us. I took it home and showed it to my mom. She explained that I have to make my own decision, that it wasn't enough to live in a Christian home. So that night I asked the Lord's forgiveness and invited the Holy Spirit to rule in me. The Lord has graciously guided and protected me to this day.

As a teenager, I asked the Lord for direction regarding college and career. He told me to study Russian, which in 1979 (Iron Curtain, Cold War) seemed like a ridiculous idea to me. But He was insistent. After studying Russian at the University of Illinois and beginning a Master's at Wheaton in Intercultural Communication, I took a "break" to earn some money. During this break, I met Mark and the Lord began to weave our stories together.

One of the themes of God's teaching in my life has been that God is not an American; His blessings are to be shared with all people everywhere. Mark and I both wanted to work overseas, especially in Russia, but given the history of the Soviet Union our options were limited. We began making preparations to work at a refugee camp located in Vienna for Eastern Europeans fleeing political oppression. In the midst of our preparations our son Jonathan was born and the Iron Curtain was dismantled. We were given permission to move to Moscow! (Remember how I thought God's plan for me to study Russian was ridiculous? I'm sure going to try never to repeat that mistake!)

We spent four and a half years in Moscow teaching English and hosting Bible studies for Russian teenagers. It was marvelous to see all the works of God's Hands during this time. I count this as one of the highlights of my life; it was such a wonderful privilege to be there.

Since our return, we've been blessed with the birth of our daughter Emma and the opportunity to serve God's Kingdom at work and in school. I always thought my testimony was boring...Sunday School yada, yada, yada.

Then I read Deuteronomy 6 and realized that actually that was God's whole plan from the beginning that parents should pass His Word to their children and that they should walk with Him all their days. As a parent now, I'm thankful to have a Deuteronomy 6 testimony and I pray that the Lord will make me a fit parent so that my children can share the same Deut. 6 blessings.

Looking back, I'm thankful to see that God has been a patient disciplinarian at smoothing some of the rough edges of my life and unlovely stains in my character. I struggle as an 'aging' adult not to become lethargic, but my desire is to keep my eyes on Him, to be conformed to His image and to follow wherever He leads.



There were several families who had major roles in discipling me, and I look back with great appreciation for their commitment, patience, guidance, and gracious handling of a large group of teens.

In transitioning to my college years, I am thankful for the church I attended and for the Urbana missions conferences sponsored by InterVarsity Christian Fellowship and hosted on our campus. It was through both of these influences and scripture from Haggai that I made a decision to pursue opportunities to live overseas.

Of course, I am very thankful that Valerie and I found the same church home after our college years. We were very blessed to have been committed to living overseas before we met and to be able to explore together what it means to be led to overseas ministry. We look back on our time in Moscow as life-changing, and our experiences there continue to affect our view of God, His world, and our place in it.

Finally, I am thankful for Jonathan and Emma who are not only great sanctifiers but provide more rewards for parenting than one could ever hope for.




