Counseling Services Offered by Covenant Seminary Students

Free counseling services are offered to anyone in need through students who are in Covenant Theological Seminary's Master of Arts in Counseling (MAC) program. The MAC program trains counselors with a "biblical approach that rigorously examines theories of human nature and counseling techniques in the context of biblical truth. Rather than dehumanizing or deifying human beings, the program seeks to train students to see every human being as a person made in the image of God, yet affected by the Fall—living both in dignity and depravity....students are trained and equipped to demonstrate God's grace and to help hurting people grow and change."

Counseling is on the Covenant Seminary campus in Creve Coeur. The students are in their final year of study and are in internships. They are supervised by one of four professors or supervisors: Dr. Richard Winter (Director of the Counseling Program); Dr. Dan Zink (former assistant pastor and social worker); Dr. Diane Powell (Visiting Instructor and Licensed Professional Counselor; or Janet Burns (Visiting Instructor and counseling at Wellspring Christian Counseling).

Sons & Daughters

We moved to St. Louis from Maryland in June of last year mainly to attend seminary. Seminary has proven almost impossible to do given that we have three small children and I have a full-time job. I am slowly learning what it means to put my family's needs ahead of my own. However, my selfish nature doesn't make that easy to do on a consistent basis. Seminary is on hold and the plan is to stay put and to stay still for awhile. My schedule in Maryland used to be packed. Now I read with my 6-year old Theodore, play "Bear Cave" with my almost 4-year old Virginia, and tickle my 1-year old Quentin. I've also spent a lot of time trying to grow my grass and smoking cigars with the new friends I meet at the local cigar place where I go a few times a week.

When I was 23 I moved to Washington, DC to work on Capitol Hill. During the first few months I found myself very lonely and thinking about the meaning of life. I came to Christ in June 1996. This was after wrestling with the nature of sin and the prevalence of the thousands of religions expressed throughout the world. I also wrestled with my own motives in thinking that it would be nice and comforting for this to be true. But truth is truth because it is true not because it is comforting or what's been passed down for generations or because the alternative to God is so horrifying to me. I personally find the challenge of post-modernism to be daunting at times because it observes the world and cowers under the sheer weight of the massive diversity in an increasingly small world. It also plays to my own tendency to sometimes be apathetic about what I hold to be certain. It replies who can make a judgment in such a world? What means are available to even make a moral or "this religion is right and those are all wrong" judgment in such a world? When I was 23 I looked at the world and saw many different faiths and asked how could Christianity, alone, be true?

Usually the answer to this question is presented as a logical explanation. It can be proofs for Christianity or arguments against other religious claims. For me there was a logical component. I had always been very interested generally in religious questions and in deeper meaning. It was pretty easy to see that, at least to me, that most other religions had very little basis in logic or objective truth. Most seemed to be practiced simply because they were handed down or ordered life in some way for a given people group. Often they are rooted in something other than what God actually would have the people do. Some religions are slightly more credible than others. But for the most part you could see how a given religion was invented at different times in different contexts over the last several thousand years. Christianity certainly had a context as well but it is different in many ways. It's not as easy pass off because starting with the person and work of Christ. It is a very different religion. This is the type of brief judgment that makes my non-Christian friends so uncomfortable, and once made me uncomfortable.

The other non-logical component of me coming to Christ was that I felt God did a great work in my life in ways that I couldn't easily explain. I prayed for various things and I had

a strong feeling that God answered my prayers. He was very actively working in my life in many ways since I became a Christian over 12 years ago.

I continue to see God work in my life. But it is in ways that appear blurry to me at times. I am not always seeing clearly these days. During the last year I've been very challenged by many of the events in my life. I have had hopes disappointed and prayers that were not answered directly or as I expected. I felt strongly called to go to Seminary with the aim of entering a full-time Pastoral ministry. I had felt through my experiences within the local churches I had been a member of that it was pretty obvious that God was clearly leading me in that direction. In the past several years I have served as a Trustee, taught adult Sunday schools on a weekly basis, led an outreach ministry, and was an elder.

It's becoming clear that despite all this I am not called to Pastoral ministry anytime soon, if ever. I'd ordinarily love to go to seminary but I don't feel energetic, it's not best for my family to have an absentee father, and I can't really afford it financially at this time. God has blessed me abundantly with a wonderful wife who loves me in spite of myself; three beautiful, healthy children who are growing up before my eyes every day; a steady job to provide for my family; and now a good church to be a part of here in St. Louis. I have not been successful in counting all the blessing around me. I have not appreciated His blessings in the lives of those around me.

I am praying that in the next year God will restore me. I want to deepen my relationship with Him but I am tired. I have hope that He will do so in the future since He has not disappointed in the past.
