Free Office Desk

This is an old style professional office desk of heavy duty construction (pre-cubical). Its frame and legs are chromed steel and surfaces are 0.75" particle board with black laminated finish. It is very strong; a person can stand on the desk without damaging it.

The desk is 60" wide by 30" deep by 30" tall and has two drawers on the right as viewed when you are seated at the desk. I had two (2) mini tower PC computers on it along with flat screen monitor and there was still plenty of room left over for keyboards and paperwork.

The desk also comes with a typing machine return that is 36" wide by 17.5" deep by 27" tall that can be attached to the left side of the desk as viewed when you are seated at the desk. When attached, it gives the desk an "L" shape when viewed from above in a floor plan view. I used the typing machine return as a stand for a multi-function printer and stored my printer paper underneath.

This is a heavy duty desk! You will need a pick-up truck and two strong guys to move it. Please contact Chris O'Neal if you want it so we can coordinate a pick-up time.

Lunch

There would be odds and ends to patch a meal together, but I hadn't planned what to serve for lunch that day. Worn out, I didn't want my Mom-what's-for-lunch? role just then. I longed for a meal, prepared by someone else, for me. Irritated and disappointed with my failed planning, I sighed through the sermon. But as communion was announced, I realized a meal had been prepared for me. I, in my weariness, was just the kind of guest He wanted. As this thought penetrated, I felt brought in out of the cold, welcomed and tenderly cared for.

Rain pelted the roof of the massive stone church as the elders took their places. The sanctuary was gorgeous and old but so oddly lit with modern lights. Dark stained glass windows eclipsed the outdoors. The combined effect reminded me of being in a basement. The pews bulged with parishioners. I felt pressed in upon, too closed in to take a full breath, and trapped. Thoughts of Noah's ark came to mind as the rainfall intensified. I was calmed with the thought of being safe in that mighty sanctuary, that ark, so closed in, while the weather railed outside. Behind my closed eyes, I could see the Shepherd in a raging rain, drenched, searching for me and plainly calling out my name. "Suzanna!"

I shifted in my seat and awkwardly peered between heads so that I could see the minister pour the wine. I could hear it run up a liquidy scale as it filled the chalice. "This is His body, broken for you". With upraised hands, the man cracked the loaf in half. There, before my eyes, was proof positive that God does indeed care for me. I felt the Lord's loving chide, "Of course I care for you! I died for you!" It sunk in well that morning.

A stooped and wrinkled man passed me a shaking tray of communion cups. I grabbed hold of the tottering tray and thought that grace comes from shaking hands. My mind had been absorbed in exhausted worry over an upcoming family visit. I was not up for it. But grace from my Savior would come, even from my shaking hands. I would be able to minister to my family members. I held the tray filled with its small clear cups. I lifted out one. There were plenty of other cups to go around. Plenty of grace. For each person, for each need. And, unlike that communion tray, the grace supply would never be exhausted.

I yanked off a chunk of the loaf and discreetly sniffed it. I pictured the aproned baker kneading it that morning for such a sacred purpose. The pleasant, yeasty aroma was enveloping. As the yeast had transformed the floury mush and the grapes had fermented into a tart wine, I took courage that I am being transformed as well, however imperceptibly.

With the benediction came another familiar sound. "Cups! Cups!" called the old African usher, holding out a grocery bag. As his voice rang out, and I placed my used communion cup in the bag, I was glad to know I would be beckoned back to the table again with my empty cup and have it filled, again.

Competent in Their Calling

Believers in Jesus Christ are called to be skilled and competent in their vocational callings, whether those are full-time, part-time or even "sideline" callings—things people do in addition to their main jobs.

Here a few vocational accomplishments of folks at Old Orchard that have come to my attention recently. This is NOT the result of a systematic search across the fellowship, so if anyone got recognition that isn't acknowledged here, it's only because I didn't know about it. One thing we might do to encourage each other is submit a short piece for the *Overture* if you hear that someone in the congregation has been recognized for accomplishment in their work.

We do live in a broken world, so it doesn't *always* work this way, but one biblical proverb attests to the principle that skill and excellence in one's work is recognizable and will be something highly prized by those with influence. And of course, the proverb is offered as incentive to pursue excellence in our work:

Do you see a man skillful in his work? He will stand before kings; He will not stand before obscure men. (Proverbs 22:29)

So here's how a few of our people's skillful work has been noticed recently.

Tami Poehlman. Tami, on a promotion in July, has been named a vice president of The St. Louis Trust Company, a family office and private trust company that today manages the financial affairs of about forty families across the United States, involving more than \$2 billion of investment assets.

Bob Carter. Bob was accepted in late spring for a part-time position at John Burroughs School teaching music, and has been having a very good semester there.

Ken Harris. The new *ESV Study Bible* has just been published and Ken is acknowledged in it for his contribution to the study notes below the text. He wrote the complete set of notes for the book of Exodus and edited the notes on Proverbs and Job.

Hans Bayer. Hans's commentary on the Gospel of Mark (in German) is about to come out any day now in Germany, and Hans too, is acknowledged in the *ESV Study Bible* as the author of the notes on Mark.
