Sandra asked that I forward this news to you....She asks for wisdom in seeking what to do next and to find a good specialist. Praise the LORD they do have health insurance!

There has been no Christian fellowship for them & the churches they've visited are so liberal. Sandra has not met many other mothers, so she feels somewhat lonely but is hoping with the onset of school there will be more potential to get to know some moms.

As far as Chuck is concerned, he is doing very well. She said that everyday he says he's glad they moved to Germany! Job is good, lifestyle suits him and so does the food. Sandra said he is much more happy & relaxed.

OOC Washer & Dryer Given Away

Since we were no longer using the washer and dryer at Milligan House on any type of regular basis, Matt Philip & I decided to give them away to a family in need. We first went to Webster-Rock Hill Ministries and were not able to identify such a family through them. So we went to Cornerstone, a ministry offering housing to low-income families, and they said they could use it. When the Cornerstone people came to pick it up, I was informed that they were going to give it to a single mom who was struggling — her car had just been stolen, and she had already expressed an interest in having a washer and dryer. So this was expected to be a real encouragement!

Dear Friends at Old Orchard Church,

As I write this, I am sitting outside the beautiful campus of Wheaton College close to Chicago, where I am attending this year's Exodus conference. Every year Exodus has a national conference, bringing together around 1000 people from all over North America who struggle with same-sex attraction. This has been a formative event for many who struggle, as they hear the testimonies and encouragement of others who have gone before them. Of particular importance to me was the presence of Dr. Robert Gagnon, professor at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary and author of several books, including the most thorough refutation of gay theology, *The Bible and Homosexual Practice*. Besides having a healthy sense of humor and an impressive knowledge of scripture and scholarship, Dr. Gagnon reminded me of what is at stake in the ministry of FirstLight.

We live in a culture that highly values love, a love that is emptied of its significance because there is no cost, no sacrifice -- just a commitment not to hold a belief too firmly lest it offend a brother. Dr. Gagnon brought us back to the truths of Jesus' love; a love that will not allow us to leave a brother or sister on a path towards destruction, a love that, even when costly, stands firm on the conviction that sin is real and its consequences eternal. Without this truth the gospel means nothing, and the work of FirstLight is pointless. It is the knowledge of their need that brings people to seek the support of others in our groups, no matter what the sexual struggle. It is the call to die to self so that we may live in Christ that brings these men and women back week in and week out to confess, repent and seek accountability. It is these groups that you, our supporters, make possible; these groups where the gospel of grace is lived out weekly in the repentance and faith of those struggling with deep sexual difficulties. With this in mind, I want to thank you for your second -quarter gift of \$312. God is being glorified as his people who gather weekly at FirstLight choose the "foolishness" of the gospel over the wisdom of the world, the narrow path over the wide road.

"To Whom Much is Given: Major League slugger delivers from the heart"

(I came across this article recently and was so encouraged to read about a celebrity's genuine desire to serve & obey the Lord. It's also about a country recently near & dear to our hearts: the Dominican Republic. Enjoy. --Annie Kuhn)

Thirteen years ago, Albert Pujols left the Dominican Republic. But the Dominican Republic never left him.

In the world of Major League baseball, rags-to-riches stories are not unheard of. But for St. Louis Cardinals first baseman Albert Pujols, the story doesn't end with the riches. Every year, Albert and his wife, Deidre, journey from their home in St. Louis to Albert's native Dominican Republic. These trips are not vacations. The two have imposed on themselves the goal of chipping away at the hopelessness of this desperately poor country, hoping to make it a better place. "God delivered me from that place, and my job is now to help others," Albert, 29, says. "It is my responsibility — what God has called me to do."

When Albert and Deidre serve, it is on dusty streets. There are often no cameras, no reporters — a fact that is not overlooked by those they work with. "They have genuine hearts, and their love for the children is outstanding," says Bernard Okeke, who works for Compassion in the Dominican Republic. "Albert is not looking for publicity, and he does not just stand there and watch. He gets involved."

Beauty in a Mattress

Even at 8 in the morning, the sun is already baking the dry, cracked streets of Batey Aleman. Albert stoops his 6-foot-3-inch frame as he climbs into the back of a delivery truck. He wipes his sweaty palms on his shorts before grabbing another mattress from the stack. As he walks through town, the mattress flopping in his arms, a crowd of children joins him, forming a ragtag parade. Albert is used to the attention of young fans. But most of these children know nothing about his baseball awards, such as being named the National League's Most Valuable Player twice in his eight-year career. They've just heard that a big man in a truck is bringing them beds. On this trip, Albert and Deidre will deliver beds to more than 50 families registered with Compassion International. For many, this will be the first gift they've ever received.

When Albert arrives at the small concrete home he has been directed to, he squeezes in through the door and carefully places the mattress on the wooden frame delivered earlier. The room is crowded, the new bed filling up most of the floor. The young mother

grasps Albert's arm, tears in her eyes. "Gracias," she whispers, over and over. He squeezes her hand, and then heads back out into the sunlight to finish his deliveries.

"I know how tough it is, to grow up in poverty," Albert says later. "These families literally have nothing." Albert was raised by his grandmother in Santo Domingo, a city marred by drugs and gang violence. The average family here struggles to survive on \$4 a day, and Albert's childhood was marked with tattered hand-me-downs and constant wishes for more. But young Albert clung to something many children in poverty never know: hope.

Compassion to Passion

On their most recent trip to the Dominican Republic in February 2009, Albert and Deidre focused most of their efforts on Compassion's Child Survival Program (CSP), which provides health care, food, and nutritional training and support to caregivers and infants. This ministry is especially important in the Dominican Republic, where more than 1 million children under the age of 5 live in poverty* and have little access to these benefits.

The Pujols family began working with Compassion in 2001, when they sponsored a child. Today, their partnership has spread across the ministry. In addition to the three children they currently sponsor, they also fully fund a Child Survival Program in the Dominican Republic.

Since 2007, they have helped fund medical care at Compassion-assisted child development centers throughout the country, including vision and dental clinics. "They come to our bateys [neighborhoods] with teams of dentists, eye doctors and medical doctors, and they help everyone, Compassion or not," says Bernard. "Today many of our children have eyeglasses and healthy teeth, thanks to the Pujols. Most of the mothers in their sponsored CSP project not only can show off their beds, but their self-esteem is way up high.... We will ever remain grateful to our Lord for the Pujols family and their foundation."

Words to Action

Albert and Deidre are realistic about the overwhelming poverty in the Dominican Republic. But both feel strongly that they can—and will—make a difference. This rags-to-riches story more accurately could be called a rags-to-redemption story for Albert Pujols. "There are 9.6 million people in the Dominican Republic, and I can't reach all of them," he says. "But I want to make sure I set an example for others to follow, for my kids, my future grandkids, and for the people of the Dominican Republic."
