


While we dearly love the Coodys, we want them off of our continent! You can help send them on their way through prayer and giving.



(Nelson's last letter as President of PMI)

July 2011

Dear PMI Supporters and Friends,

There is no time like today to serve Christ and make Him known to lost sinners. That is the heartbeat of Presbyterian Mission International (PMI) and our missionaries. The tragedies of earthquakes, tsunamis, tornadoes, revolutions and civil war have recently made this all the more obvious. The world needs Jesus.

Starting in 1988 with just one missionary family, PMI has grown to a family of 22 international families serving in 16 countries. We are planting churches in Buenos Aires, Auckland, Nairobi, Bangalore, Bangkok, Tokyo, Goiania (Brazil), Verona (Italy), and Manipur State (India). Some of our missionaries teach in seminaries and Bible colleges, while some lead ministries of charity and orphanages. All of our missionaries, or their spouses, have come from other countries to Covenant Theological Seminary. Upon graduation, PMI has helped them return to their own countries. Visas are not needed, nor do our missionaries need to learn a foreign language or adapt to a foreign culture, as they return to minister among their own people. It has been a great privilege for me to serve as President of PMI for the last nine years. Now I am stepping down as my wife Kathy and I move from Covenant Seminary in St. Louis to New Haven, Connecticut, where I will join the staff of the Overseas Ministries Study Center.

We are ecstatic that Tom Hudson, PMI's new Director, and his wife Carol are coming to us from Mission to the World (with their concurrence and blessing). The Hudsons served with MTW for 30 years, primarily in Portugal but also in Miami. Tom is fluent in Portuguese, plus he is conversant in Spanish and reads Italian. He has done church planting as well as worked in theological education. Tom and Carol have five children and three grandchildren. While in Lisbon, they gained experience working on an international missionary team of Portuguese, Brazilians, Irish, British and Dutch.

Because our PMI policy is to pass on 100% of gifts

designated to our missionaries (based on an annually board approved budget for each family), Tom and Carol need to raise financial support for themselves. Most mission boards

charge an "administrative fee" to their missionaries and with those monies hire office personnel. Because PMI has had so many able volunteers, including several Covenant Seminary faculty, we have not had to charge the missionaries for office services. That does require, however, that Tom, as our new Director, raise funds for their own support. Please seriously consider a monthly, quarterly, or annual pledge, or send a one-time gift, to PMI for the Hudsons' support. Please add the Hudsons and their financial need to your prayers as well.

#### Jessica Patterson, dispatched to Afghanistan

Jessica Patterson, former member of Old Orchard Church, works for the United States Department of State and had earlier assignments in Israel, Chile, and as the Desk Officer for Algeria and Tunisia at the State Department in Washington, D.C. Two years ago she had a temporary assignment to Afghanistan and decided she wanted to return. She is on a one-year stint there (with the option of serving a second year) as a member of a Provincial Reconstruction Team. She left for Kabul on July 10. After a week of consultations at the U.S. Embassy there, she will head to her new home in Sharana, Paktika, near the border with Pakistan, and a fairly dangerous area.

Jessica wrote this in a recent (July 7) email:

One piece of good news: I already know most of the team I'm joining. I have yet to meet any of the civilians (about 10 people - agriculture & development experts and some engineers), but I trained for 11 days in Indiana with the military part of my Provincial Reconstruction Team (about 90 people). The Commander and I are off to a great start. Some military PRT commanders don't really value their civilian counterparts (sometimes for good reasons, sometimes because the military commanders are simply old school and don't understand counter-Insurgency strategy or the importance of good governance). My commander, however, told the military part of the team that they work for me as well as for him. He also said, 'I've spent most of my career landing planes on naval aircraft carriers and you've spent most of your career convincing foreign interlocutors to do things that we believe are in their and our interest, so of course you should take the lead in working with the Afghan civilians.' So, it sounds like I will have plenty of space to do my work. (More about that in a second).

The rest of the team was great too. Our security detail guys (New Jersey National Guard) consistently got top marks in their training, so I should be well-protected. I stayed in the barracks in Indiana, so got to know the seven other women on my team a bit. Six of them are enlisted and one is an officer. I had dinner with them one night and talked about the importance of developing relationships with Afghan women; I asked if they were willing to engage Afghan women in addition to doing their assigned jobs on base. All of the enlisted women said they were willing, but had nothing to offer. Of course they have a million things to offer, so one of my goals will be to empower them to realize it. Because in most Pashtun areas American men cannot talk to Afghan women, we have huge blind spots. In some instances, for example, PRTs have built wells for a village in a location recommended by engineers. However, women continue to walk 2 hours to gather water b/c the well is too close to a mosque (a place where men gather), so it is inappropriate for them to go there. That kind of stuff wouldn't happen if we were talking to women, so, for the good of the Mission and for the good of the women on my team, I want to train them to engage some. It helps that I (sort of) speak Pashto because it means that we'll still be able to talk to women even if we don't have a female interpreter (some bases don't).

My work—I'll be meeting with the Provincial Governor a lot trying to support his efforts at good governance and rule of law. We (the provincial governor and I, along with various other members of my team) will travel the province together working with district leadership on everything from developing systems for the local government to engage the provincial government, to reintegrating Taliban who agree to live by the Afghan Constitution, to identifying ongoing sources of instability and how best to address them. I'll have to tell you more about my work once I'm doing it. The military side of my team got there 10 days ago, and I've gotten some fun emails from some of them that make me more eager to go.

#### An Update of Midtown Church Plant

July 13, 2011 e-mail

A few highlights from the last few weeks:

- We have been having an average of 25 adults and a dozen children each Sunday night for fellowship at the Tuckers home. Many have come to check us out, at least 25 have committed to be part of the Core Group. We had a wonderful time of fellowship at our first Core Group retreat a few weeks ago. We also had our first celebration of the Lord's Supper together. We are still hoping to add more to our Core Group before we launch, hopefully in January [2012]. Please feel free to join us any Sunday evening. Pray about being a part of this new endeavor.
- A young man who has attended our group, Branden, took me and a Core Group member to a section of St. Louis by the river, called "Hopeville." Hopeville is a conglomeration of tents and plankboard "homes" that homeless folks live in. We brought water bottles and discussed ways that Midtown might be involved.
- LOCATION SEARCH: Things are getting heated up with the Location Identification Team. We were looking at one church, and found out it is going up for sale! Then I saw the posting online and was duly shocked to find out the asking price is 1.6 Million! Clearly, if this is to happen it will be "more than we could ask or imagine." All that to say stuff is happening. Some good news is that we have one very good option to rent space in Midtown at Central Baptist Church. Contract is on the way. Please pray that the Lord directs our steps in this decision.

#### PRAYER UPDATE:

- · Thanks to the Lord for our retreat.
- Pray for the growing population of homeless AND for the many women in our city who have become victims of the sex trafficking industry (we just had a ministry come share with us, International Crisis Aid, who have homes for women rescued from this).
- Pray that the Lord will add to our Core Group a diversity of ethnicities and ages.
- Pray for our location team that is hunting around for a space in Midtown. Our goal is to be in a location by mid-August.
- Pray for our Core Group as they also seek to love folks outside the church.

#### FINANCIAL UPDATE:

**Goal:** \$200,000 over 3 years. \$107,000 **pledged** as of today. **Need remaining:** \$93,000

If you haven't already, please consider giving to this work.
