## Our Children's Ministry

**Nursery** is offered for infants & children through kindergarten age. Our nurseries are in the church building basement.

- Infant nursery for babies, crawlers, & very early walkers.
- **Toddler nursery** for children who are walking up to three years of age. Children who turn three from January-August are invited to attend preschool worship starting September 1. Children who turn three from September-December are invited to attend preschool worship starting January 1.
- **Preschool worship** for age 3 through Kindergarten. Three-year-olds (see above) and four-year-olds are welcome during the whole service. Five-year-olds remain upstairs in the worship service until they are dismissed at 10:50.
- Children's Worship For children in grades 1-5 meeting at Milligan House. Listen for dismissal announcement, usually around 10:50 am. See Jessie Swigart or Mark Robertson for questions.

## **Renovation Loan**

We all appreciate the renovations that were done several years ago that have given us a beautiful space to worship in while retaining the history and look of Old Orchard Church. Due to God's blessing and the generosity of those who support our congregation, we are getting close to being able to pay off the rest of the money we borrowed to accomplish this renovation. We refinanced the loan a couple of years ago to get a better rate, but small organizations don't get the kind of rates that individuals do (due to increased risk), and we are looking at the current rate of 6.9% and feeling we could do better while still paying off the loan in the next few years.

The Session has decided to take a different approach and ask willing members of our congregation to take on the debt at a lower rate that would still give them a better return on their money than a savings account or certificate of deposit.

Here is the situation and the Session's proposal:

- We currently have ~\$62,000 left to pay on our loan, and we are currently being asked for a monthly payment of \$1,450 at an interest rate of 6.9%.
- We do not have enough money in the renovation fund to continue making these payments past November.
- We have calculated that if our loan were converted to a 4% interest rate with a 4year term, and considering annual gifts that have been guaranteed to us to help pay off principal, our monthly payment would only need to be \$731.
- We are asking for personal loans to pay off our current loan with the bank, and we would then ask for the congregation to renew their support for the renovation with pledges to help us make these monthly payments, which would then be sent to those who loaned us the money.

The Session will provide more information at Sunday's congregational meeting, but we wanted to communicate the overall plan to you so you understand why we think a change is needed.

Where: Both will be at Milligan House (just across street from church)



### "Two Nights Together"

This fall, instead of meeting on three consecutive Wednesdays for our annual "Three Nights Together," we will meet on Sundays—and, because of a busy fall schedule as a church, we will meet two Sundays in a row rather than three, on October 7th and 14th.

This annual, fall get-together is designed to give us a forum to think and talk together—about issues and questions that matter, and to draw friends, neighbors, acquaintances and co-workers into our conversation. This year we will watch an hour-long (roughly!) film each of the two nights, and then have a conversation about it afterwards.

**On Sunday evening, October 7, at 6 pm,** we will watch "*Michelangelo Revealed*," a provocative documentary about the life, art and faith of the great Renaissance painter, sculptor, poet and architect, Michelangelo(1475-1564). First aired in 2009, this is a show directed by award-winning Italian documentary film director, Fabrizio Ruggirello, and is an episode in the PBS series, *Secrets of the Dead*. Some of us got together to watch this film in June but many of you did not see it that night, so you'll have another opportunity to see it as part of our "Two Nights Together" this fall.

The film's fascinating and provocative claim is that there are subtle hints in Michelangelo's art and in his private letters to his faith in Jesus Christ at a time when the medieval Catholic Church was being challenged by the Protestant Reformation to reform itself by returning to the Bible.

The film traces out the work of Italian art historian, Antonio Forcellino, who was commissioned to clean Michelangelo's famous marble statue of Moses—and found himself stunned by what he discovered about the statue upon closer examination. That sets him on a quest to learn more about Michelangelo, and to try to solve several inconsistencies in the historical record ignored by some historians but puzzled over by others for centuries. For sure, this film will set you thinking, wondering and wanting to read more.

**Bring a friend** and join us for an intriguing evening that will take us back five centuries in time! We will meet at 6 pm on Sunday, October 7 at the church building, and light refreshments will be served. Childcare will be provided, *but you must sign up for it with Mark Robertson*.

The second film, to be shown at the same time on October 14, will be announced shortly!

Dear Friends,

This is just to give you a heads up about the dates for next year's Rochester L'Abri Conference - so you can reserve that weekend if you are interested in coming. We will meet, as usual, at the Kahler Grand Hotel in downtown Rochester, MN, over the weekend of February 8 & 9, 2013. The theme will be "Every Tribe & Nation...Crossing Divides with the Gospel of Reconciliation." This follows somewhat logically from this year's theme of Creation, where reaffirmation of our common origins 'in Adam' and our creation in the Image of God provides a basis for the equal dignity of all peoples. This is of course reinforced by the eschatological vision of Rev 5&7, where 'every tribe and tongue and people and nation' gather before the throne. I want to follow loosely the flow of Galatians 3:28 for the Plenary addresses and hope to cover some of the major dividing lines that plague us, looking at them through the lens of the Gospel of reconciliation.

As usual, we have an excellent line-up of speakers and a terrific assortment of workshops to choose from. All the details will be available in our brochure which should be out in the mail by October.

## It is the gift of God

"But because of His great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, made us alive with Christ even when we were dead in transgressions.... For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith-- and this not from yourselves, it is the gift of God..." (Ephesians 2:4-8)

We've heard that our salvation is a gift from God so often, I think we need to reconsider what God's gift is really like. First, let me describe what it is not like. It is not like a gift we may receive for Christmas or our birthday. A gift may be hoped for, or expected, or even hinted about. A gift may be a treat, something extra, a bonus or luxury. It may be helpful or even a timely resource. We may see it as payback for gifts we have given; an obligatory exchange. In our wealth and comfort we sometimes receive gifts we don't even want or need. But we don't usually think of a gift as something necessary for our lives.

We don't think of a life preserver thrown to a drowning man as a "gift" from the lifeguard. We don't consider CPR on a heart attack victim to be a "gift" from a compassionate by-stander. Being pulled from a burning car wreck by another motorist is not spoken of a "gift." But that is closer to the kind of gift God has given us. Before He gave us faith and salvation, we were dead. Dead people can do nothing for themselves. God's gift is truly the resuscitation of our lifeless souls. We are saved by God's grace through faith; but even that faith is a gift from God. He is the rescuer and reviver of dead people.

He is like the good shepherd who goes after the lost sheep that would surely die alone in the wilderness. He is like the poor woman who lights her costly oil lamp in her dark house, sweeps the dirt floor and searches on her knees until she finds her very valuable lost coin. He is like the astonishingly humble father who runs out to his exhausted, famished son who is limping home from a distant land, restoring him in love to full sonship. But even more to the point, God's gift to us is life. By His Word, we are brought out of death: "Talitha Koum! Arise little girl!", "Young man, I say to you, get up!" and "Lazarus, come out!" Jesus brings life to dead people. It isn't owed to us. It isn't expected. It isn't a nice surprise or a pleasant custom. No payment is needed, or even possible. It is grace-- undeserved, unearned, free, and complete. It is a gift beyond all others. This gift is our rescue: from death to life with our Lord. What a gift! What a Savior!
