Typhoon Relief

There are probably some in the fellowship who did not get to us in time their contribution for relief work in the Philippines, or got their check to us *after* we sent out what we had collected. So we want to provide another opportunity for any who may still want to give toward this larger cause of typhoon relief. Our own PMI missionaries in the Philippines, Rene and Lani Quimbo, sent us last week this note below. Our Foreign Missions Ministry is advising that we send any 2nd gift for relief work to the Quimbos to use on their upcoming trip to help victims in Leyte:

"We would like to let you know that we are planning to go on a short mission trip to Palo, Leyte, **one of the** towns hardest hit by the typhoon, which left many orphans. We plan to go the first week of January 2014 and do a sort of VBS program for the kids, hoping this will help them understand God's love despite their personal tragedy, We hope to contribute to the healing process. We will have carpenters with us to help rebuild some homes. We will bring our chainsaw, carpentry tools, our tents, food and water, and some dried fish to share with people there. We hope to share with them the Living Hope we have in Christ Jesus our Lord. We covet your prayers; may the Lord grant us success in these endeavors. Whatever help you can contribute for this trip will be very much appreciated. Thank you very much."

Foreign Missions Prayer Requests for December 2013

1. Jon and Tanya Coody – **St. Petersburg, Russia.** The Coodys need to change apartments because of serious issues with their landlord. (See their letter elsewhere in the *Overture*.) Pray for the Lord's own divine solution to be made apparent to them very soon. Pray especially for Tanya who is having her life seriously disrupted again, amid the dark and cold of the Russian winter. Pray for an awareness of the Lord's love and presence with them all. Pray for physical, spiritual and emotional strength.

2. Wilma Cross – Santiago, Chile. Pray for preparations for a team from OOC to visit Wilma next summer. Pray that the right people will volunteer and for Mark as he prepares them for the trip. Pray for Wilma's spiritual and physical strength as she has a very busy schedule: she leads seminars, speaks at retreats, often traveling to other cities. She ministers to many individuals as well as needing to care for many practical tasks.

3. Rob and Tünde Futo – Budapest, Hungary. Pray for the Christmas concerts that Tunde will be leading Dec. 14-15, that the Lord will protect the musicians and use the concerts to honor Him and touch many souls. Pray for them and their family in the Christmas season.

4. L'Abri Fellowship – England and Switzerland. Pray for students as they finish the fall term in early December. Pray for the workers that they will have a restful break until the new terms begin in January. Pray that the Lord will bring a good mix of students. Pray especially for financial need in the Swiss branch.

6. Dawn Miller – Madrid, Spain. Pray for Dawn as she finishes her final year at Covenant Seminary, that she will learn what the Lord has for her this last year. Pray for her work with the young people at OOC and as she teaches the women's evening Bible Class. Continue to pray for her witness to her family.

7. Joseph and Elfi Muutuki – Nairobi, Kenya. Pray for the Christmas activities in the church and outreach. Pray for peace and stability in Kenya. Pray for the spiritual growth and protection of a former Muslim woman in their church who has become a believer. Pray that leadership positions in the church will be filled.

8. Luciano and Luciene Pires – Goiania, Brazil. Praise that the Lord is richly blessing both the work of Colloquium and the new church. Pray that the Lord will provide abundantly for their critically low personal financial support. Pray that they will be able to take a restful vacation in January, as they are very tired with the two responsibilities.

9. Rene and Lani Quimbo – Mindanao, Philippines. Continue to pray for the relief efforts for the victims of the typhoon. Pray that local churches will be strengthened through help given by Christian charities. Thankfulness that the Quimbos were not directly affected though it struck nearby. Pray for them as they carry on their extensive work and are involved in some relief efforts (see top of this page). Pray for the Lord's strength and protection in this vulnerable part of the world.

10. Joel and Jessica Rinn – **Verona, Italy.** Pray that the Lord would supply the elders needed in Trinity Church (near the military base). Praise for opportunities that both Joel and Jessica have to interact with the people in the community where they live, both in various activities connected to their children's schools and with individuals. Pray that they will have opportunities to share the Gospel and that it will fall on fertile ground.

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Blood Drive as Gratitude

Some of you may remember that we prayed this past summer for Emily, the 28 yr.-old niece of our neighbors, Tim and Kathy Randall, who live right next to the Wilkes. Emily contracted E. coli bacteria and nearly died. But thanks be--truly--to God: she came out of a deep coma, survived, and is doing well now!

Emily received numerous blood transfusions, and so to show gratitude for the tremendous help this was to Emily's recovery, the Randalls and her wider family are hosting a blood drive on **Monday**, **December 30**, **from 2-6pm**, and it is our privilege to serve this family by letting them use our "parlor" (back of the sanctuary) for this public-service effort. *The family has invited anyone from our congregation who is able and willing, to join them in this "pay-back" project and give blood on that day.*

This is a fine way to show solidarity with our neighbors and contribute something positive to the public good. If you're willing to participate, put it on your calendar now! And thank the Lord that he spared the life of this young woman (a former co-worker of our daughter, Susannah), who had been married just less than a year when she took sick.

Here are some tips we found at the American Red Cross site for preparation for giving blood. This particular blood drive is not being done by the Red Cross, but by Mercy Hospital.

Tips for a Successful Donation

By following a few recommendations before, and during your blood donation can help you make your donation experience as safe, successful and pleasant as possible.

Before Your Donation

- Maintain a healthy iron level in your diet by eating <u>iron rich foods</u>, such as red meat, fish, poultry, beans, spinach, iron-fortified cereals and raisins.
- Get a good night's sleep.
- Drink an extra 16 oz. of water or nonalcoholic fluids before the donation.
- Eat a healthy meal before your donation. Avoid fatty foods, such as hamburgers, fries or ice cream before donating. (Fatty foods can affect the tests we do on your blood. If there is too much fat in your blood, your donation cannot be tested for infectious diseases and the blood will not be used for transfusion.)
- If you are a platelet donor, remember that your system must be free of aspirin for two days prior to donation.
- Remember to bring your donor card, driver's license or two other forms of ID. [We do not know yet what Mercy Hospital may require.]

During Your Donation

- Wear clothing with sleeves that can be raised above the elbow.
- Let the person taking your blood know if you have a preferred arm and show them any good veins that have been used successfully in the past to draw blood.

We hope that this finds you enjoying the Advent season. We have been reflecting with our church and as a family on God's faithfulness to His promises to send a Rescuer, as well as His promise to return.

A couple of months ago we wrote about the blessing of finding a new apartment near Anna's school. The highlight of our time here has been that not just Anna, but also Tanya and Mark have made lots of new friends through the school. This has been a huge blessing, especially as Tanya had felt so isolated our first year living in another part of the city. I have very full days of serving at the university, and it is so nice to know that Tanya and the kids are able to be part of an encouraging community during the day.

On the other hand, we also wrote concerning all the problems we have had with this apartment. Well, the problems continue. After 2 months of not having a working stove, we finally decided to replace it without the help of the landlord (although he should have taken responsibility and replaced it). Through this experience, we have realized that it is no longer wise to stay here. He continues to play games with us, suggesting that we have broken things or that he carries no responsibility whatsoever, except to continue to receive too much money for rent. Though we have made numerous repairs to the apartment (toilets, pipes, electricity, etc.), he continues to accuse us of taking advantage of him.

Unfortunately, this sort of situation is all too common here, and that is one reason why we have hesitated to move. It is als o complicated and expensive to make a change - realtor fees, deposit, etc. We have hit a wall, though, and we are now praying for God's direction as to where to move next. Would you please join us in praying for God's direction?

We reflected a couple of days ago on the words of the great Christmas hymn, "oh, tidings of comfort and joy." This is what we want to experience in light of our Saviour's coming. Please pray with us that we will not allow these circumstances (or landlords) to rob us of that joy and comfort.

Thank you for standing with us in praying for our family and our ministry here in Russia. We are grateful for you!

Dear friends,

I was shocked when, looking at the calendar yesterday, I realized only 2 months have passed since we moved to Sumter, S.C. for Chip to begin his role as Director of Community Ministries at Westminster. In so many ways it feels much longer. But, I have the calendar to keep me honest, motivating me to get you this update before more time flows by.

We truly hit the ground running once we arrived. Unfortunately, the drama with the moving company (for those of you who knew) continued right to the end—a learning experience, for sure. Thankfully, it did not taint the sweetness of the welcome we received.

From day one, we have been blown away by the immediate connection we've had with people. It has been an intense but beautiful time of developing relationships, getting a feel for Sumter, and preparing to move from the house in Mayesville (a tiny agricultural community 20 minutes outside of town) to the home the Lord has provided for us near the church. We are so amazed! Within 4 weeks of our arrival, we had already found and put an offer on a house and been accepted. The house on Mattson is a place in which we can express hospitality both to the community around us and to any of you who might venture east. Our doors are open: please let us know if we can have the honor of hosting you and treating you our small-town delights.

The small-town setting was not what we imagined for ourselves when we underwent our time of ministry preparation. Our list originally included church planting, overseas ministry, or a large church where we could engage outreach, educational ministries and the arts. The Lord obviously had a different plan— children's continued discipleship and formation. We would appreciate your prayer as we gradually discover the Lord's design for us here: how to be who we are in a way that benefits his church here in Sumter, humbly building his kingdom, not our own.

In brief:

- ✤ We are thankful for a new house--we moved in on 12/7!
- Chip is taking to his role like a duck to water--such a good fit
- Chip and Kelsey lead worship 4 of 5 Sundays. We are enjoying leading together again.
- The girls are making close friends already (as are we all!)
- Thanksgiving was spent with all of Chip's family: so thankful to be near enough for frequent visits.

Please pray for:

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- Chip as he partners with Stuart Mizelle to help lead and care for Westminster pray for them to continue to grow in the strong and gracious relationship they've begun.
- ★ Kelsey, who has been diagnosed with arthritis and degenerative disc disease in her neck (the result of untreated trauma from whiplash, many years back). She is undergoing treatment, but the pain has made daily activities like teaching the girls, writing, playing guitar, cooking, cleaning, and even sleeping, a struggle.
- The girls started school at Alice Drive Elementary on 12/9 in part to give Kelsey the space and time she needs to heal. Pray for this adjustment from homeschool to public school and for wisdom to know how to engage in the school system and for how long. McKenna & Murrin are already praying for their new community, longing for those who do not know Him to hear the good news of salvation!
- The posture of all our hearts as we speak, in the church and out, of the Hope that has found us.

Thoughts on Advent A pastoral letter* *Chip Reed*

Americans are losing the ability to wait: store clerks set up Christmas on the heels of Halloween; we feed our "needs" with the immediacy of drive-thru windows; we no longer have to wait through commercials with programs like TiVo, HuLu and Netflix; road rage abounds because we have no patience for traffic.

Consider the ancient Israelite: he faithfully studied the Scriptures, endured persecution for his faith in Yahweh, waited with deep longing for promised Messiah to come. His hope: with the Messiah's arrival, all suffering, destruction and death would pass away.

He imagined a Conquering King would come, establishing an earthly kingdom by force. God had a different plan: a plan to establish His kingdom in men's hearts. As a result, many missed the Incarnate Lord, come in obscurity not in power, wrapped in feeble flesh and swaddling clothes, not the royal robes befitting a king.

Advent is about waiting, about expectation, like the ancient Israelite, for our Messiah to come, as He promised. In hope, we wait for Jesus to return differently this time: with power and authority. He will unite all things to Himself and establish His Kingdom forever on earth as in heaven. All things will become new (Rev. 21).

What does it mean to wait for your Savior? What will His return mean to you? What deep longing have you ignored? Meditate on the yearning of your soul, beneath the superficial appetites satisfied by a trip to the local department store or drive-thru. This hunger only The Father can satiate; this thirst quenched only by drinking of Jesus' love for you. Keep your eyes on Our Conquering King and know that He loves you, He prays for you, and that His mercies are new every morning. He will return!
