Echoes of Eden in Poetry, led by Jill Donovan, will end after Sunday, April 27.

Next class: Life Lessons from Apologists I Admire, led by Mark Ryan, will meet May 4, 11, & 18. This 3 week class will serve as an accessible introduction to three well-known Reformed apologists. Our mornings together will commence with some word of biography, move into outlining the apologetic method adopted, and conclude with some broad points of application or 'life lessons'. As some in our midst will have met these men and others will have read their works, discussion will also be encouraged. The three apologists we will focus on are: Cornelius Van Til (May 4), Francis A Schaeffer (May 11), and Richard B. Keyes (May 18). (Please note: The nature of this short class is practical, rather than philosophical; it is more geared toward re-introducing these men than it is to engaging in a deep study of apologetic theory).

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Hal and I can hardly find the words to express our gratitude for everyone's many, many expressions of love: cards, words of encouragement and hope, books, flowers, food, gift cards, patience with my lack of communication the first 2 months, prayer visits, helps of every sort, and most precious--your prayers. I really leaned on that knowledge that you were praying. You have truly been His love fleshed out to us through the church, and feeling His love happened to be exactly what I think He allowed me to be flattened for. It is rare for me to be thankful for hardship...it's not my style... but I can truly say that I am glad this infection caused, and is still causing, such havoc, as He has hounded and pursued me with His love, bringing me to a place that I needed to be. I have learned so much as I have been unable to do a thing but lay and listen and learn to be more intimate with Him, to *listen* rather than hurling my requests at Him and "submitting with boundaries." I still am learning, and old habits are hard to break, but as He slowly heals my ability to digest food, He is also slowly healing my heart to be more able to grasp just how much He loves me, and to listen more to Him and His word. It's amazing how the simple first-learned concepts of the gospel need to be re-learned and remembered over and over...40 and more years after one first understands and accepts the Gospel as true. Truly we are like sheep....

C.S. Lewis says, "God whispers to us in our pleasures, speaks in our conscience, but shouts in our pains." So true. Christ's victory on the cross this season is especially sweet to Hal and me this year, and you have all have been powerful tools in His hands to make it sweeter. Many, many thanks.

Hey Dot,

Chuck here. We are so blessed to have so many good Christian friends. Thank you so much for praying for Sandra. In prayer, I hope for the best outcome but remain confident in God's plan. That being said, I am very pleased and my faith has been strengthened that God's plan worked out to be so good here.

If I may tell a short story about this whole ordeal: All of Sandra's friends have been questioning her about faith and why Sandra was relaxed going into the operation period. She told them repeatedly that Jesus loves her and that the God (don't know exactly what she told them) of the Bible was in charge and would take care of her. My family, especially my brother & his wife and my Buddhist sister, all admitted to the strangeness of this whole time of praying for Sandra. My brother and his wife, who don't pray often (so I get the feeling, maybe I'm completely wrong) said that whenever they and their kids thought about Sandra they immediately felt led to pray and did so. They said it was the most strange feeling they've had with prayer.

My sister, in her own way, said she prayed too, but without focusing on anything Biblical.

When after the surgery I heard that everything went perfectly, I emailed my family "total success" and my brother's response was amazing. He just wrote one word: Unreal.

My beautiful wife is healed from this tumor and the people around us have a fairly high belief that prayer worked and that the God of the Bible and Jesus were involved. What a great testimony to God's faithfulness to us His beloved children.
