

For those of you who are new to our fellowship and may not have much experience in observing it, Lent is the 40-day period before Easter that many Christians down through the centuries have used to prepare themselves for the church's yearly celebration in the spring of the suffering and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. Every Sunday is a celebration of Christ's death and resurrection, but from the early centuries onward the Christian church in the West has seen fit to mark these great events in a special way once a year on the first weekend after the first full moon in the Spring. This year, Lent began on Wednesday, February 6, Good Friday is on March 21, and Easter is on March 23.

Originally, Lent was a forty-day period of fasting, a time of sobriety and repentance (with the exception that there was no fasting on Sunday since each Sunday was a celebration of the Resurrection.) "Lenten-Tide" was the old Anglo Saxon term for spring, and as this pre-Easter fast was always in the spring, it came to be called "Lent". The period was set at 40 days in light of Jesus' own forty-day fast at the beginning of his public ministry (and Moses' and Elijah's forty-day fasts before that).

We live in a secular, a feel-good age. Some of that has changed since 9/11; people seem more willing now to admit that evil is real. Still, we don't like to "dwell on the negative." But Christians live differently: they know how to mourn and laugh as a daily way of life. We laugh because we know that Jesus Christ has conquered everything that threatens to ruin God's world; but we mourn because we take sin and the brokenness of life seriously. As one Christian writer put it:

Only insofar as we comprehend sin can we comprehend Christ.

And remember the stunning fact we've reflected on in our sermon series on Matthew: Jesus, who for modern people seems to be about only love and compassion, began his public preaching ministry with the rather sober and unsettling challenge, "**Repent! For the kingdom of heaven is near!**" Character really does count, and Jesus finds us all wanting.

Yet he came into the world not to judge the world but to save it, by suffering under God's just punishment for sin—our sin. *So Lent is about the love underneath Christ's pain*. But the pain was the measure of the love. So use this season to remind yourself again of the brutality of Jesus' crucifixion and the excruciating pain he endured even before he was nailed to the cross.

Use the gospel readings on the last page of this handout during Holy Week (Palm Sunday, March 16, through Easter, March 23), as they will enable you to walk with Jesus, as it were, through that last painful week of his life before his crucifixion. Just about a third of the text of the gospels is devoted to the events of the week before Jesus' death. There's a reason, as someone put it, that the biblical record slows down rather than speeds up when it gets to the events of Holy Week.

Let me encourage you to use the meditation by Oswald Chambers below to draw near to our Lord over the coming weeks. And do not be afraid to go down into the depths with Christ as you mourn the terrible remaining selfishness of your own heart, and the terrible sufferings and injustices in the world. How could we not feel sick at heart on hearing the news Thursday night that an angry citizen in Kirkwood stormed into a town council meeting, killing five people?

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But remember, too, that the cross not only bespeaks pain but victory, because God and man were reconciled there, and all who trust that will outlive the anguish of the world. Remember that those willing to do the hard thing of mourning will be surprised by everlasting joy, according to the psalmist's promise:

weeping may last for the night, but joy comes in the morning. Psalm 30:5

As we continue moving toward people, showing respect and truly caring about them and earning the right to speak of our great Savior, we should realize that the world aches to know how to reconcile life's sorrows with its joys; and we should remind each other that it's the gospel of the grace of Jesus Christ that teaches us how to do just that.

Acquaintance with Grief

"A man of sorrows and acquainted with grief." —Isaiah 53:3

We are not acquainted with grief in the way in which Our Lord was acquainted with it; we endure it, we get through it, but we do not become intimate with it. At the beginning of life we do not reconcile ourselves to the fact of sin. We take a rational view of life and say that a man by controlling his instincts, and by educating himself, can produce a life which will slowly evolve into the life of God. But as we go on, we find the presence of something which we have not taken into consideration, namely, sin, and it upsets all our calculations. Sin has made the basis of things wild and not rational. We have to recognize that sin is a fact, not a defect; sin is redhanded mutiny against God. Either God or sin must die in my life. The New Testament brings us right down to this one issue. If sin rules in me, God's life in me will be killed; if God rules in me, sin in me will be killed. There is no possible outcome but that. The climax of sin is that it crucified Jesus Christ, and what was true in the history of God on earth will be true in your history and in mine. In our mental outlook we have to reconcile ourselves to the fact of sin as the only explanation as to why Jesus Christ came, and as the explanation of the grief and sorrow in life. —Oswald Chambers (1874-1917)

~ Good Friday ~ March 21

As is our custom, we will gather in homes on Good Friday at 5:45 p.m. for a simple meal. There are two types of meals, *sharing meals* and *reciting meals*. In a sharing meal there is open sharing with each other how Christ's finished work on the cross is having its effect on us, right where we live. In a reciting meal we read to each other the dramatic story (highlighted from Genesis to Revelation) of our rebellion and God's redemption. We encourage you to bring non-Christian friends to these meals. We also need hosts for these meals; especially those living within Webster or 10-15 minutes of Cornerstone. (*Call the church office by Wednesday, February 20 if you can host one of these meals.*) There will be a special meal for children (*divided ages: 1-4; 5-11 years*) at the church during these adult meals (arrival time at 5:30 p.m.). Look for sign-up sheets on Sunday, February 24.

This year, following the Good Friday meals, we will worship at Cornerstone Evangelical Free Church **at 7:30 p.m.** with our brothers and sisters in Christ there. As we celebrate Christ's death together that night it will be a symbol of our need to stand unified as Christians in our testimony to the wider Webster Groves community.

March 23

Volunteer to serve in the nursery on Easter morning. See sign-up sheet in next couple weeks.


~ Closing ~

Lent, as a time of preparation for Good Friday and Easter, is to be a time to find again the Center, the Center of all our work, our outreach, our ministry, our strivings, our confidences: Christ's experience of humiliation, pain, and death on our behalf, that we might be delivered from all the powers of the Evil One, and given instead a share in the splendor of God's kingdom.

Using the season of Lent for spiritual focus—reflecting on the depth of human wretchedness that Jesus the Son came to undo, and on his obedience to the Father in life and in death; tracing the action of the drama of redemption that leads up to the climax at the cross that Friday; examining our lives to see where we have not been, but should be, living out the Beatitudes, the character traits of the citizens of the Kingdom Jesus inaugurated—all this does not add up to a morbid preoccupation with our sin and brokenness for the next six weeks! Marking Lent may not be allowed to dampen our joy and confidence that Christ lives now at the Father's right hand, that

our place is there with him in the power of the Holy Spirit, and that he actually wants to use us, to draw us up as co-workers with him as he works to make his Kingdom come.
